1. Create a new account or login to your account using your previous details from last year's show entries or any other show that uses Show Day Online
2. Select the Myrtleford Show
3. Click on PLACE AN ENTRY
4. Click on INDIVIDUAL ENTRY
5. In Entrant Name select your Entrant from the drop down or click on ADD NEW to add a new entrant to your account
6. If clicking Add New fill out your Entrants name. Other fields are optional
7. In EXHIBIT TYPE select
 - HORSES & CATTLE for Horses & Cattle
 - FARM ANIMAL for Other Animals
 - PAVILION / INDOOR / DISPLAY for all Other Sections
8. Click on SELECT CLASSES
9. From the drop down choose what you would like to enter
10. On the pop up tick the box to accept the entry notes for this section
11. Click the PLUS symbol beside the section you are entering to expand to the classes
12. Click on the class or classes you are entering to select them
13. If entering multiple items into the same class, increase the QTY counter to reflect the number you would like to enter
14. Fill out the item's name in the Exhibition Name box if applicable e.g. painting name and any other fields as asked
15. ONCE ALL CLASSES HAVE BEEN SELECTED
16. Click on ADD ANOTHER ENTRY if you need to place more entries for this show and repeat this process.
17. Click on FINISHED ADDING CLASSES if you do not need to place any more entries for this show.
18. On the next screen select do not select any 'extra items'. These are not relevant to The Myrtleford Show competitions.
19. Click on FINISHED ADDING EXTRAS once done.
20. Tick the box to agree to our website T&C's
21. Click on the payment type and enter any payment details as required
22. Click on PAY NOW and follow the payment options.

Regulations

- Dogs must be measured from the shoulder blade vertically in line with the front leg.
- Only one dog is permitted in the competition area at a time.
- All non-competing dogs must remain on a lead in the marshalling area.
- Each dog is allowed up to three attempts at each height.
- Dogs may jump on a loose lead or be released at least 3 meters from the jump.
- Handlers may position a catcher at the top and/or bottom of the jump (supplied by the owner).
- The competition area should measure approximately 15m x 8m.
- Any misuse or mishandling of a dog will result in immediate disqualification.

CATTLE

General Regulations

ALL CLASSES

- General Livestock Regulations
 - All exhibits must be on the grounds by 8:00am on Show Day.
 - Friday bump-in is available before 7:00pm (contact stewards in advance).
 - All animals are exhibited at the owner's risk.
- Animal Requirements
 - All cattle must:
 - Be NLIS tagged
 - Come from Johne's Disease-free herds
 - Be registered (if applicable) or eligible for registration
- Handling & Safety
 - Bulls over 12 months must be nose-ringed and led accordingly.
 - Beef heifers and cows must be led by nose dog clips in the ring.
 - All animals must be halter-trained and under effective control at all times.
 - Stewards may remove any animal deemed unsafe.
- Housing & Equipment
 - Exhibitors must:
 - Provide halters and neck ropes for tethering
 - Ensure animals are securely tied in stalls
 - One bale of bedding will be provided for entries received by Monday 19 October. Late entries must supply their own.
- Paperwork
 - National Cattle Health Declarations and indemnity forms must be completed before judging.
 - Name & registration number of the animal must be stated on the entry.
- Electrical Safety
 - All leads and equipment must be tested and tagged.
 - Joined leads must be weatherproofed.
 - The Myrtleford A&P Society subscribes fully to the National Code of Ethics devised by All Dairy Breeds Show Ring Committee (ADBSRC).
 - Tea and Coffee is available - sponsored by Prism Pastoral – exhibitors are encouraged to bring their own reusable mugs.
 - Most successful exhibitor: points to be allotted as follows:
 - Four entries or more: 5,3,1.
 - Three entries: 3,2,1.
 - Two entries: 2,1.
 - One entry 1.
 - In the event of a tie between two or more exhibitors- Champion to be allotted 5 points, Reserve champion 3 points

VAS - CATTLE PARADING & JUDGING sponsored by Rosemont Angus

- State Final Cattle Parading & Judging Rules & Regulations
 - Parader competitions are conducted under the ASA regulations.
 - Competitors must be 15 years & under 25 years of age on the 1st May in the year of the State Final & must reside within Victoria.
 - First & Second Placegetters are eligible to compete in the State Final.
- Show Level Cattle Parading Rules & Regulations
 - Age of parader must be 8 years & over as of the day of the Show.
 - Parader must be attired in suitable clothing including solid shoes or boots.
 - The parader must lead a heifer under 2 years as of the day of the Show only.
 - Paraders animal must be eligible for breed registration with their respective breed society or entered in an ordinary class with details of exhibit on the respective Show/Event entry form for insurance purposes.
 - The judge may ask the parader to swap animals if required.
 - Adult or steward assistance is acceptable for a parader under 12 years. (Preferred that siblings are not the assistance)
 - Competitions can be split into several age groups depending on the number of entries & level of experience.
 - Parader competitions are conducted under the VAS & ASA regulations.

RECIPE

Ingredients

250g sultanas	¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg
250g chopped raisins	½ teaspoon ground ginger
250g currants	½ teaspoon ground cloves
125g chopped mixed peel	250g butter
90g chopped red glace cherries	250g soft brown sugar
90g chopped blanched almonds	½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
⅓ cup sherry or brandy	½ teaspoon almond essence
250g plain flour	½ teaspoon vanilla essence
60g self-raising flour	4 large eggs

Method

Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Class 761 VAS Boiled Fruit Cake - JUNIOR

RECIPE

Ingredients

½ cup sherry	375g mixed fruit
2 eggs, lightly beaten	¾ cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons marmalade	1 teaspoon mixed spice
1 cup self-raising flour	½ cup water
1 cup plain flour	125g butter
¼ teaspoon salt	½ teaspoon bicarbonate soda

Method

Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil. Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from stove, add bicarbonate soda and allow to cool. Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well. Tip: Do not overmix the mixture. Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined 20cm round cake tin. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours or until cooked when tested.

Ingredients

375g plain flour	345g castor sugar
2 teaspoon baking powder	350ml vegetable oil
1 ½ teaspoon bicarb soda	4 eggs

½ teaspoon ground nutmeg	220g tin crushed pineapple, drained
½ teaspoon allspice	180g pecan nuts coarsely crushed

Pinch of salt

Method

Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan), Grease a 23cm (9 inch) round cake tin and line with baking paper.

Sift the dry ingredients together into a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrots, crushed pineapple and pecans. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake tin.

Bake for approximately 90 - 100 minutes.

Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack. Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.

MYRTLEFORD & DISTRICT A & P SOCIETY RULES and REGULATIONS

GENERAL REGULATIONS (ALL SECTIONS)

- The following regulations apply to all exhibitors and all sections of the Myrtleford Show unless otherwise stated.

Exhibits & Entries

- All exhibits must be the bona fide property of the exhibitor and, where applicable, the work of the exhibitor.
- Entries close as specified in each section of the schedule. Late entries will only be accepted by prior arrangement with the Steward.

Judging & Awards

- The Judge's decision is final.
- Judges are empowered to withhold awards in any class where exhibits are deemed unworthy.
- The Committee reserves the right to disqualify any exhibit that is incorrectly entered or where false statements have been made.
- In the event of doubt regarding eligibility (including age of livestock), awards may be withheld pending verification.

Conduct & Behaviour

- Any exhibitor or person who interferes with, insults, or behaves improperly toward a judge, steward or volunteer may be removed from the grounds and forfeit any prizes awarded.
- Members of the Society may also be subject to disciplinary action, including expulsion.
- Decisions of the Committee in matters of conduct and eligibility are final.

Display & Removal of Exhibits

- Exhibitors must not display prize tickets or awards from previous shows on any exhibit.
- Prizes and exhibitor names may be affixed only after judging is complete.
- Exhibits must remain on display until 4:00pm on Show Day unless otherwise permitted.
- Exhibitors are responsible for arranging supervision of their exhibits where required.

Risk & Liability

- The Myrtleford Show Society is not responsible for any loss of, or damage to, exhibits.
- All exhibits and animals are displayed entirely at the exhibitor's risk.
- Any injury, however minor, must be reported immediately to the Secretary's Office and recorded in the incident register. Failure to report may affect insurance claims.

Prize Money

- Prize money must be collected after 4:30pm on Show Day unless otherwise stated.
- Unclaimed prize money will be forfeited.

Affiliations & Disciplinary Actions

- This Society is affiliated with relevant agricultural show bodies. Penalties imposed by this Society may be recognised and enforced by affiliated organisations including VAS.

Disputes & Protests

- Any dispute or protest must be lodged with the Steward and referred to the Secretary's Office accompanied by a \$100 deposit.
- The Committee will adjudicate the matter. The deposit will be refunded if the protest is upheld.
- All decisions of the Committee are final.

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
