- The dog is permitted to jump onto or over the jump
- All dogs not competing must be on a lead with a handler in the marshalling area behind the competition area.
- Competition area should be 15 metres long by 8 metres wide.
- Only ONE dog may be loose in the competition area at any one time.
- There can be a handler at the top of the jump to act as a catcher if necessary and a handler as a catcher at the bottom. The dog's owner must supply the extra handler.
- Each dog is allowed three (3) attempts at each height if necessary.
- A dog may compete on a loose lead or can be released at a minimum of three (3) metres from the jump.

ANY MISHANDLING OR MISUSE OF A DOG WILL INCUR IMMEDIATE DISQUALIFICATION.

201 VASL Rich Fruit Cake (must use recipe 1)

1. VAS LTD - RICH FRUIT CAKE (Senior Classes):	
<p>Recipe: 250g sultanas 250g currants 250 g chopped raisins 125 g chopped mixed peel 90 g chopped blanched almonds 90 g chopped red glace cherries 1/3 cup sherry or brandy 250 g plain flour 60 g self raising flour</p>	<p>250 g soft brown sugar 250 g butter 4 large eggs ¼ teaspoon grated nutmeg ½ teaspoon ground cloves ½ teaspoon ground ginger ½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind ½ teaspoon almond essence ½ teaspoon vanilla essence</p>
<p>Method: Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight. Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon. Square straight sided, square cornered tin. Place the mixture into a prepared square tin 20 cm tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3.1/2 – 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin. <i>Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size, it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4 or 6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3 or 4 pieces.</i></p>	
<p>Regulations: An exhibitor having won at a Show will bake another cake for entry in the Group Final; the winner will then be required to bake a further cake for the State Final at the next Royal Melbourne Show. An exhibitor having won at Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show until after the Group judging, when, if not the winning entry, can compete further. An exhibitor having won at Group Level <u>cannot</u> compete further until after the Royal Melbourne Show. Each cake entered must be the bona fide work of the exhibitor. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final Level, then the second place getter 13 eligible to compete</p>

3. JUNIOR: BOILED FRUIT CAKE (Junior Class):

Recipe:

375 g mixed fruit
1 teaspoon mixed spice
125 g butter
½ cup sherry
2 tablespoon marmalade
1 cup plain flour

¾ cup brown sugar
½ cup water
½ teaspoon bicarbonate soda
2 eggs, lightly beaten
1 cup self raising flour
¼ teaspoon salt

Method:

Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil. Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from the stove, add bicarbonate soda and allow to cool.

Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well.

Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place mixture into a greased and lined 20cm round cake.

Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.1/2 hours, or until cooked when tested.

2. VAS: CARROT CAKE COMPETITION Proudly sponsored by Rocky Lamattina Open to carrot cake enthusiasts everywhere. Competitors to use only the recipe below Prize money same as Rich Fruit Cake		
Recipe: 375 g Plain Flour 2 tsp Baking Powder 1 1/2 tsp bicarb soda 2 tsp ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg 1/2 tsp allspice	345 g castor sugar 375ml vegetable oil 4 eggs 3 medium carrots, grated (350 gm) 220 g tin crushed pineapple, drained 180 g pecans, chopped	
Method: 1. Preheat oven to 180c. (160c. Fan) Grease a 20cm (8") round cake tin and line with baking paper. 2. Sift the dry ingredients together in a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrot, crushed pineapple and pecans. 3. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake tin. 4. Bake for approximately 90-100 minutes or until a bamboo skewer inserted into the centre of the cake comes out clean. 5. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack. Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.		

4. VAS: CARROT AND DATE MUFFINS - A competition for junior bakers under 18 on the day of the show. Prize money same as Junior Boiled Fruit Cake	
Recipe: 2 1/2 cups Self raising flour 1 tsp ground cinnamon 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg 1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed) 1/3 cup chopped pitted dates 1 cup coarsely grated carrot	1 tablespoon orange marmalade 1 cup canola oil 2 eggs, lightly beaten 3/4 cup orange juice 1 cup reduced fat milk.
Method: 1. Pre-heat oven to 190 degrees C (moderately hot) 2. Line a 12-hole muffin pan with Round Paper Muffin Cases (Classic White Muffin Cases Size (35mm Height x 50mm Base) 3. Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl; stir in dates, carrots. Then add the combined marmalade, oil, eggs, juice and milk. Mix until just combined. 4. Spoon mixture evenly into Muffin paper cases in muffin pan. 5. Cook for 20minutes. To test if muffins are cooked insert a cake skewer; if it comes out clean the muffins are ready. 6. Stand muffins in pan for 5 minutes before removing to cool 7. Show entries: Four (4) muffins per plate.

If you are considering entering the 2018 Myrtleford Show here are a few helpful tips:

- Exhibits are to be **completed by 8.30am** on Show Day ready for judging.
- If you are exhibiting, plan to pick your flowers and keep them in a bucket of water – from the base of the stems up to the flower heads.
- Remove all dead leaves from the pot plants you are entering.
- Ensure that you have removed any dead flowers from the exhibit.
- When entering pansies, ensure that the faces are turned upwards, looking at the judge.
- Read the schedule carefully, there may have been changes.
- Supply your own clean containers making sure that the labels have been removed.
- For staging separately, green beer stubbies & wine bottles are excellent and use paper or foam to ensure that the stems remain upright. Whilst containers are not judged, they are certainly more appealing to the eye when care has been taken with the display.

- All exhibits must be the bona-fide property of exhibitors. Exhibitors of Stock will be required to furnish full particulars as to the age and pedigree of each exhibit; also the breeder's name (where same is known) and such other information as the Committee may demand. The Committee reserves the right to disqualify any exhibit improperly entered, or regarding which any false statement has been made.
- Entries close as stated in each section.
- In all Pavilion Sections, 1 ticket per entry will be issued to exhibitors. This is to be attached to exhibit. Every livestock exhibit must purchase tickets from Steward.
- All exhibitors must place their exhibits in the space allotted to them by the Committee of Management.
- All cattle and sheep entered for exhibition must be in the yards by 8 am, and all other exhibits not later than 9 am on the morning of the Show.
- Ages of horses to date from 1st August. Ages of cattle to date from 1st July, unless otherwise stated.
- The Judges are empowered to withhold prizes in any class where the exhibits are deemed unworthy. In the event of the judges having any doubts as to the ages of any exhibits in the stock classes, the prize shall be awarded subject to the Committee obtaining satisfactory proof of the correctness of the exhibit.
- The Committee will give every possible facility to exhibitors; and every care will be taken of exhibits; but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society.
- Any exhibitor refusing to attach the prize card to any exhibit for which a prize is awarded; and to keep the same on during the exhibition, may, on proof thereof to the Committee, be disqualified from receiving all prizes awarded to the said person during the Show.
- Any person insulting or interfering with the judges during the Show may be subject to removal from the grounds, and in the prizes, if any, awarded to him/her forfeited. Members of the Society so transgressing will be liable to expulsion.
- Prizes may be affixed to all exhibits, and competitors may affix their names to their exhibits after the judges have given their decisions.

- All exhibits in sections for Farm Produce, Pickles and Sauces, Cookery, Needlework and Miscellaneous, must be the work of the exhibitor. All exhibits in the Dairy Produce, Jams and Preserves and Flower Sections must be grown or manufactured by the exhibitor except in decorative section.
- No exhibitor shall display on any exhibit any prize ticket, or ribbon other than that of those awarded at this Society's current Show.
- Payment of all prize money will be made after **4 p.m.** Show Day only. Monies to be collected.
- This Society is affiliated with the North-Eastern Agricultural Societies' Association of Victoria, V.A.S. Ltd, E.F.A. and North East Border Axemen Association. It has been determined by the body that in the event of any exhibitor being offensive to any judge, his entry will be declined by all Societies affiliated with the Association, and any prize money won by him/her shall be with-held. Other penalties imposed by the Society in the Association will be upheld and enforced by all affiliated members.
- In the event of injury, however small, a report must be made immediately to the Secretary's Office with witness and be entered into the incident book. Otherwise, insurance compensation cannot be guaranteed.
- Any dispute must be taken by the Steward to the Secretary's Office and on payment \$100 deposit; the dispute will be handled by the Committee. If the complaint is proved the deposit will be refunded.
